Introduction:

It was only when he was able to see for himself that the crucified Jesus was the risen Christ that Thomas proclaimed his faith unequivocally, 'My Lord and my God!' But we who, like the first readers of the Gospel, 'have not seen' can know Jesus' blessing of peace by putting the testimony of the Gospel to the test of living it out in the world so 'that through believing you may have life in his name' (v.31).

Gospel Reading: John chapter 20:19-31 (NIV) JESUS APPEARS TO HIS DISCIPLES

'On the evening on that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" after He said this, He showed them His hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father sent me, I am sending you." And with that, He breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive someone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

JESUS APPEARS TO THOMAS

Now Thomas [called Didymus], one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in is hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it."

A week later His disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came in and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" Then He said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

Thomas said to Him, "My Lord and my God."

Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen me and yet have believed." Jesus did many other miraculous signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not recorded in this book. But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name.

Meditation: THOMAS

Did He condemn me for doubting? Not a bit of it – He understood, and answered.

Perhaps I should have believed earlier –

After all, I had my fellow disciples' word that Jesus was alive –

But can you appreciate I wanted to be sure?

Don't forget, we were grief-stricken when He died,

Numb with despair,

None of us listening when Mary and the others rushed back from the tomb

Declaring it was empty and the Lord raised –

No, not one.

We feared it was wishful thinking, a beautiful but sad delusion,

For though Jesus had spoken of rising again,

We never imagined it could really happen.

It was just my luck not to be there when He appeared again,

And though I longed to accept He was truly alive,

I didn't dare to trust lest it were all to prove a ghastly mistake.

I couldn't have lived with more disappointment,

Not after what we'd been through already,

So I closed my mind to the idea until Jesus stood before me,

Inviting me to touch, and feel, and know.

Seeing is believing, isn't that what they say,

And so it was for me.

So how, may you ask, can anyone possibly believe without seeing?

Well actually they can,

For even though He's gone from us now,

Returned to the Father,

I know He's with me still,

Every moment of the day –

Here through His Spirit in His risen power.

I can't see Him, but I can feel His presence,

For ever by my side.

Not that you have to take my word for it –

I wouldn't expect that.

Reflection:

Author Leslie Flynn tells the story of small boy being brought up by his grandmother. One night, the house caught fire. Trying to rescue her grandson, she was overcome by smoke and died in the fire. Unfortunately,

the city only had a part time fire department. A crowd gathered as they heard the small boy crying out for help. Suddenly, a man pushed through the crowd and began climbing an iron drainpipe which ran to the roof. The pipe was hot from the fire, but he made it to the second floor window. He crawled through and found the boy. With the crowd cheering encouragement the man climbed back down the hot iron pipe with the boy on his back and his arms around his neck.

A few weeks later, a meeting was held to determine in whose care the boy would be placed. Each volunteer willing to give the boy a home made a brief statement. The first said: "I have a farm and would give the boy a good home. He will grow up on the farm and learn a trade. "The second speaker was a local school teacher. She promised the boy would have a good education. The third speaker was a bank manager who promised he would give the boy a good home and fine education. The Presiding Officer looked around and asked if anyone else would like to say anything. From the back of the room a man rose and said: "These people are able to offer some things I can't. All I can offer is my love." Then, he slowly removed his hands from his coat pockets. A gasp went up in the room because his hands were scarred terribly from climbing up and down the hot pipe. The young man was recognised because of his hands. The boy whose life he saved ran into his waiting arms. The farmer, teacher and bank manager simply sat down. Everyone knew what the decision would be. The scarred hands proved that this man had given everything he could.

John tells us that on Easter Sunday evening, the disciples were together, in a house somewhere in Jerusalem, hiding behind locked doors for fear of reprisals from the Jewish authorities. Despite the good news brought by Mary Magdalene that she had seen the Risen Jesus, the disciples were still sceptical and afraid. As they talked together, they were suddenly conscious that someone else was present – Jesus. He greeted them with the traditional Jewish greeting 'Shalom' – Peace be with you. Then He showed them his hands. **They recognised Him by His hands.** They were overjoyed at seeing Him again. He repeated His message of peace and His purpose in coming to them – to bless them with the promised gift of the Holy Spirit. But someone was missing from the group – Thomas. When he joined the other disciples, they were eager to share their news – they had met with their Risen Lord. But Thomas wasn't convinced. He wanted proof. He wanted to see Jesus' hands.

A week later, the disciples were together again in the same house in a locked room. Thomas was with them. Again they became conscious that Jesus was with them. He greeted them in peace. Jesus pre-empted Thomas' questioning with an invitation to touch His hands and challenged him to stop doubting and believe. Was this aimed at just Thomas – or to all the disciples? Was this the point where all their doubts and uncertainties that they had expressed over the previous three years were finally satisfied? Had Thomas spoken for all of them in his declaration: "My Lord and my God"? The scarred hands proved that Jesus had given everything.

Jesus' self-disclosure to the disciples on Easter Sunday evening and the following Sunday is most appropriately understood as the fulfilment of virtually everything Jesus had promised them in His farewell discourses:

THE PROMISE

The Fulfilment: "I will come to you" [chapter 14 v. 28]

"My Father and I will come to him [ch. 14 v. 23]

Jesus came and stood among them: [ch. 20 vs. 19, 21 & 26]

"Peace I leave with you; my Peace I give to you." [ch. 14 v. 27]

"I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace." [ch. 16 v. 33]

"Peace be with you." [ch. 20 vs. 19, 21 and 26]

"In a little while you will see me no more, and then after a little while, you will see me." [ch. 16 v.16]

"I will see you again and you will rejoice, and no-one will take away your joy" [ch. 16 v. 22]

The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord. [ch. 20 v.20]

"I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Counsellor, the Spirit of truth." [ch. 14 vs. 16-17]

The Counsellor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things." [ch. 16 vs. 7-15]

With that He breathed on them and said: "Receive the Holy Spirit." [ch. 20 v. 22]

Could there now be any doubt? What about our doubting and uncertainties?

If the empty tomb signified to the belovéd disciple Jesus' departure to the Father. His appearance to the disciples signified His return. He has not come back to pay them a brief visit, but to stay. His return is the beginning of a new relationship. Three times, the risen Jesus reveals Himself to the

disciples with the greeting: "PEACE BE WITH YOU." The scarred hands proved that Jesus had kept His promise.

When doubts and questioning cloud our vision, when troubles and difficulties close our eyes to the goodness of God, we need to draw closer to Jesus through worship, Scripture, prayer, reaching out to our brothers and sisters in faith. As the verse of the hymn reminds us: (Singing the Faith 28 v. 3)

Join the hand of friend and stranger; Join the hands of age and youth; Join the faithful and the doubter In their common search for truth.

JESUS HOLDS OUT HIS HANDS TO US IN WELCOME

Prayers of Love and Concern on this day which remembers World Health:

Almighty God, You are eternally patient with us, and no matter what we do, You persevere with us. Help each of us to show patience and perseverance with others; and with this prayer in our hearts and on our lips, we pray for those we know and love and hear of this day.

For those areas in our country where unrest or religious divides bring people out onto the streets in protest. 

Reading: Acts 3:12-19

Reflection:

In 'The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse' by Charlie Mackesy, (it's a gorgeous book and quickly read with wonderful illustrations – do try to get hold of a copy – and Enjoy! with tears) the mole remarks that the greatest illusion is that life should be perfect. By way of illustration, Charlie Mackesey includes the page from his manuscript 'marred' by a paw print from his dog. We are far from perfect. All of us make mistakes. Some of them are minor.

Take a moment

to think about any mistakes

you have made

recently

Apart from asking for God's forgiveness is there anything else you now feel prompted to do?

It is important that we understand that not all mistakes are sins, nor should we feel guilty after them. Some are necessary and even positive in order to learn or gain experience. The inventor Thomas Edison describes how he found thousands of ways a light bulb wouldn't work (i.e *mistakes?*) before he came up with a working light bulb. Few of us learn how to ride a bike or drive a car safely the first time; we have to have a number of goes, sometimes a lot!

In her insightful book *Failure*, Emma Ineson records a story that exposes a common misunderstanding of the nature of the failure that the Bible calls sin. Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury, was the speaker at a church gathering where he declared he was a sinner. 'Well,' responded an outraged woman in the audience, 'if I had known that you were a sinner I wouldn't have bothered to come today!' and stalked off in high dudgeon. She made the error of imagining that because someone had attained importance in the Christian church, he or she could not possibly be a sinner.

The truth is, however, that all of us are sinners and have fallen short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23). It is what we do when we own this truth that is the crucial thing. Peter makes this point in this week's passage from Acts. His audience had committed a very serious mistake in not recognising who Jesus really was; it took him to the cross. However, by coming clean about this, through confessing that they had done wrong opens the way to forgiveness. They had acted in ignorance along with their rulers. That's the bad news. And it is bad news for us too. Our failure takes God to the cross. But, here's the good news: by recognising our failure to live as God desires and turning to him brings us forgiveness and the restoration of that relationship brings new life. Then we can experience 'the incredible forgetfulness of God' to use a striking phrase by Emma Ineson. God does not remember or hold against us the sins that we have truly confessed. He offers us a fresh start, a new beginning that will bring joy.

The image of the Lord as shepherd and the people as the flock is developed in this Psalm. It recalls the ways in which the 'Shepherd of Israel' (Psalm 80:1) guided the people from exile to homecoming, from fear to trust, along the 'right paths' through the 'darkest valley' to the 'house of the Lord'. On their journey through the wilderness, God's rod fends off wild animals, the staff keeps the sheep from wandering, and a table of manna and quails was spread (Psalm 78:19).

Gospel Reading: John 10:11-18 THE GOOD SHEPHERD Introduction:

In Matthew (18:12-13) and Luke (15:4-6), the parable of the lost sheep evokes God as 'Shepherd of Israel' (Psalm 80:1). In Matthew (26:31-2) and Mark (14:27-28), Jesus uses Zechariah 13:7 to understand his death, as well as his disciples' desertion, as integral to His call as Shepherd: 'I will strike the shepherd and the sheep will be scattered'. This is close to what Jesus tells us here, 'The Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep'.

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand is not the shepherd who owns the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep.

I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me – just as the Father knows me and I know the Father – and I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also. They too will listen to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd. The reason my Father loves me is that I lay down my life – only to take it up again. No one takes it from me but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down and authority to take it up again. This command I have received from my Father."

THE SHEPHERD

To what lengths would I go in looking after my sheep?

That's a good question.

I'd watch over them night and day if I had to,

For it's dangerous country out there,

And there are wild animals aplenty that would make a meal of them given the chance.

I'd search for them, too, should they be lost,

And yes, defend them if necessary, provided I was suitably armed.

But knowingly surrender my life for them?

No, I'd draw the line at that,

After all, it's sheep we're talking about, nothing more,

A way of earning a living -

Keeping a roof over one's head

And money in one's pocket.

There's no room for sentimental attachment,

Would any go further?

Certainly, none I know of.

A hired hand wouldn't, that's for sure;

They'd run a mile at the first whiff of danger;

And even the most dedicated among us would save their own skin first If push came to shove.

No, I've heard of some good shepherds in my time,

But to lay down your life for your sheep would be something else.

Would any flock be worth it?

Reflection: 'THE GOOD SHEPHERD'

Two men were called into a classroom to recite Psalm 23. One was a great public speaker – trained in speech technique and drama. He recited the Psalm in a powerful way. When he finished, the audience cheered and asked for an encore so that they could hear the wonderful voice again. The other man repeated the same words – "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.....". But when he finished, the audience sat in silence, instead, people sat in a deep mood of devotion and prayer.

Then the first speaker stood to speak. "I have a confession to make;" he said, "the difference between what you have heard from my friend and what you heard from me is this. I know the Psalm, my friend knows the Shepherd."

Shepherds and shepherding have always played a significant role in the way God works through His chosen servants. Abraham, the father of the nations, was a shepherd to a considerable number of flocks; Moses was shepherd to the flocks of his father-in-law Jethro when God called him to a special service; David was a shepherd boy destined to be the King of Israel and the writer of many of the Psalms, including Psalm 23. When Isaiah spoke of the coming of the Messiah, he spoke of one who would "feed His flock like a shepherd! He will gather His lambs into His arms."

The tradition of a shepherd was very much a part of the heritage of Christ. So how did Jesus perceive His role as our Good Shepherd? How did He understand the nature of the power given to Him by the Father?

AN UNDERSTANDING SHEPHERD

The first thing Jesus reveals about His understanding of His role and His authority is that He is highly sensitive to our problems. Other shepherds are

hired men who think first of self-preservation. They see the wolf coming and run in the other direction. Jesus sees that the wolves are coming also. He is conscious of the problems directed at our lives. He is aware of the problems we have to face. He is alert to our difficulties.

What Jesus makes clear about His claim to power is that He so completely identifies with our problems that He is willing to lay down His life for us. Jesus faced the same problems and the same enemies. It was not that Jesus was just aware of how intense life can be for us. For Him, there were always new and first temptations. They did not come from within His own being. We are offered comfort from that when we feel alone and overwhelmed by our own difficulties.

IN INTIMATE SHEPHERD

Not only does Jesus know our problems, He knows us. This isn't an acquaintanceship or casual relationship; He does not happen to know us by sight. When He talks about knowing us, He is talking about a unique, intimate relationship. When you were young do you remember that a parent could figure out what you were doing? It was always a puzzle to me! It was equally a surprise if they knew when I'd done something wrong — even though they weren't there! "I've got eyes in the back of my head". Have you ever said that? They were also expert at reading body language; a blush, a nervous twitch, a quiet movement. All were giveaways by which we were rumbled. They knew us "inside and out". That's the intimate kind of 'knowing' Jesus speaks us.

Jesus reassures us that He knows His own. He lived and died to make that happen. It is by His great sacrifice that **we** know what **He** is like. He showed us the full extent of His love by the price He paid. He literally lived out the Word by suffering and dying for us. And because we know this, we know the Father – as Jesus knows Him – and as He knows Jesus. Because we can know the Good Shepherd, we can know that God is love.

THE LOVING SHEPHERD

What can help make us certain of this is that it is universal. If we feel lonely, down hearted, when we question our self-worth, we need to remember that there are many other people feeling exactly the same – even if that seems of little help to us at the time. What can be a major source of comfort and hope is that Jesus tells us He loves us all unconditionally. We can't escape it; it is universal. There absolutely cannot be any doubt that He loves us. If His sacrifice was for all – then His love must be too.

THE LEADING SHEPHERD

This may be difficult to appreciate if we are not familiar with biblical shepherding. My knowledge is limited to television's 'One Man And His Dog' – which is very different to Jesus' experience of shepherding. What Jesus saw was a more intimate scene of a town shepherd in a small rural area who lived with the sheep out in the plain and drove them into the sheepfold at night and lay down at the entrance of the sheepfold to serve as the very door to the sheepfold itself. The sheep were safe. Nothing could get in.

We all have our own images of shepherds and sheep – just as we all have our own images of Jesus. What we can be certain of is the picture He gives of Himself – tender hearted, full of compassion, love and forgiveness and He wants us to experience that. He was able to lay down His life and three days later take it up again. That is power and the greatest love ever shown throughout history. It is out of that love that He cares for us. The shepherd for whom nothing is beyond our imagining. That is the Good Shepherd and the Good News. I wonder if there is someone you know who you know that needs to know that too?

Bible Reading – Acts 8:26-40 (NIV) Philip and the Ethiopian

²⁶ Now an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Go south to the road—the desert road—that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." ²⁷ So he started out, and on his way he met an Ethiopian^[a] eunuch, an important official in charge of all the treasury of the Kandake (which means "queen of the Ethiopians"). This man had gone to Jerusalem to worship, ²⁸ and on his way home was sitting in his chariot reading the Book of Isaiah the prophet. ²⁹ The Spirit told Philip, "Go to that chariot and stay near it." ³⁰ Then Philip ran up to the chariot and heard the man reading Isaiah the prophet. "Do you understand what you are reading?" Philip asked. ³¹ "How can I," he said, "unless someone explains it to me?" So he invited Philip to come up and sit with him.

³² This is the passage of Scripture the eunuch was reading:

"He was led like a sheep to the slaughter, and as a lamb before its shearer is silent, so he did not open his mouth.

³³ In his humiliation he was deprived of justice.

Who can speak of his descendants?

For his life was taken from the earth."[b]

³⁴ The eunuch asked Philip, "Tell me, please, who is the prophet talking about, himself or someone else?" ³⁵ Then Philip began with that very passage of Scripture and told him the good news about Jesus.

³⁶ As they travelled along the road, they came to some water and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water. What can stand in the way of my being baptized?" ^{[37] [c]} ³⁸ And he gave orders to stop the chariot. Then both Philip and the eunuch went down into the water and Philip baptized him. ³⁹ When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord suddenly took Philip away, and the eunuch did not see him again, but went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰ Philip, however, appeared at Azotus and travelled about, preaching the gospel in all the towns until he reached Caesarea.

Thought From The Day:

A schoolboy was very upset when his father, for economic reasons, stopped him travelling by train to school because he could get a free bus pass. Little did he know that one of the schoolgirls he befriended on those bus journeys would later become his wife! Sometimes something quite ordinary can change our lives completely. At the time it didn't appear to be a nudge by

the Spirit as happened to Philip in our Acts reading. However, in retrospect, both saw the hand of God at work. We do not know what a journey can bring us or who we will meet that will profoundly affect our life and purpose. Perhaps this will encourage us to pray before we set out on a journey – not simply for safety in our travels, but for those whom we might meet on the way.

Perhaps one of the most famous stories is of an invitation to Billy, a young farm boy, to drive a vegetable truck packed with youth to a tent crusade. He joined the others inside and the evangelist made such an impression that Billy felt called to become an evangelist, even though he had had very little formal education. Little did he know that he – Billy Graham – would preach to millions, including presidents and world leaders, and many churches would be reinvigorated by those who responded to his call to get out of their seats and come up front.

Probably our own encounters will not be so dramatic as that, but you never know what the God of surprises has in store for you. However, if the journey we take this week will forge a new friendship, give you fresh insight through a chance conversation, or simply bring solace or hope to a lonely person, that journey will have been worthwhile.
