Scripture Reading: Mark 1:4-11

⁴ John appeared, baptizing in the wilderness and proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ And all the country of Judea and all Jerusalem were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶ Now John was clothed with camel's hair and wore a leather belt around his waist and ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷ And he preached, saying, "After me comes he who is mightier than I, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. ⁸ I have baptized you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." ⁹ In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰ And when he came up out of the water, immediately he saw the heavens being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. ¹¹ And a voice came from heaven, "You are my beloved Son; ^[a] with you I am well pleased."

Thought of the Day:

Blah, blah!' Who would have thought that these three words – are they even words? – would be the start of a serious challenge to a group of powerful politicians and world leaders? The young Greta Thunberg was referring to a series of climate change conferences, suggesting that they were 'just talk' and that serious action should be taken before it was too late. 'Blah, blah!' was no use when serious, far-reaching, action was needed. The courage and foresight of this young girl was and is a catalyst for action.

Over the centuries people have spoken words or carried out actions that have triggered action or new movements. The civil rights movement in America was triggered and strengthened by the actions of people such as Rosa Parks, the woman who refused to sit in the area designated for black people on a bus; or in the powerful words of Martin Luther King in his speech 'I have a dream'. That might remind us of the words of another Martin Luther, generations earlier, who said, 'Here I stand, I can do no other', triggering the reformation with his words and actions.

The ultimate example, of course, is the 'wind from God, sweeping over the face of the waters' dividing light from darkness and bringing order from chaos – the word and breath of God in action. This week's Psalm offers other examples of the power of the voice of God: 'The voice of the Lord shakes the wilderness', 'The God of glory thunders', 'May the Lord bring peace to his people'.

There is much 'stirring up' in the pages of the Bible, such as the story of John the Baptist. He certainly stirred things up, and paid the ultimate price for it. He proclaimed a new start, with people acknowledging their wrongdoing and turning their lives around – beginning again. He announced the coming of Jesus who would bring another new start through his death and resurrection, and the sending of the Holy Spirit. The effects of this were seen by and in the people whom Paul baptized in Corinth; and the effects are seen in people today, filled with and stirred up by the Holy Spirit.

Action and stirring to action are the name of the game when God's Spirit moves. And there is just as much need today for us to look out for signs of God's spirit 'moving over the waters' and bringing new life and new beginnings. Let it never be said of us that we are just 'Blah, blah, blah!'

Show me how to stand for justice: how to work for what is right, how to challenge false assumptions, how to walk within the light. May I learn to share more freely in a world so full of greed, showing your immense compassion by the life I choose to lead.

Teach my heart to treasure mercy, whether given or received — for my need has not diminished since the day I first believed: let me seek no satisfaction boasting of what I have done, but rejoice that I am pardoned and accepted in your Son.

Gladly I embrace a lifestyle modelled on your living word, in humility submitting to the truth which I have heard. Make me conscious of your presence every day, in all I do: by your Spirit's gracious prompting may I learn to walk with you.

Prayers for Others:

Eternal God, in our ever changing world in you there is stability and the opportunity of a new beginning. So, we pray now for those whose lives are in turmoil, those whose lives have been turned upside down, those who feel lost.

May they feel supported, find fresh hope,

and use our prayers in Jesus' name to strengthen them.

We pray for those for whom life is difficult due to abuse, for those who need to know your love and care, for those who feel desperate, alone and worried about their jobs, their finances, their mental health.

May they feel supported, find fresh hope:

We pray for children and young adults in their schooling, we pray for those who enjoy learning from home, pray too for those with confidence and self esteem issues and feel vulnerable.

We remember their parents and the parents of children with special needs, struggling to cope.

May they feel supported, find fresh hope:

Lord, use our prayers in Jesus' name to strengthen them.

We pray for the people of your world, where there is so much turmoil, unrest and pain. Grant to the leaders of nations your wisdom, courage and strength to speak out for all.

We pray too for countries around the world struggling with ethnic violence and militancy.

May they feel supported, find fresh hope:

From the earliest days of the Methodist societies, John Wesley invited the Methodist people to renew their covenant relationship with God. Reflection:

My dad used to grow beautiful roses and would let me help him when he was pruning them. As a child I could never quite understand the need to cut back quite so much of the plant and was convinced it would die. But, of course, it never did and each year the blooms were more wonderful than the year before! My dad explained how a rose bush couldn't just be left to look after itself. Before too long it would begin to strangle itself, the buds wouldn't get enough light and the plant would become weak. A rose needs a bit of help, my dad would say. And he would show me which shoots to cut away and which to leave, so helping the plant to get as much light as possible and thus be as productive as possible. Over the years there have been many times I wished I'd listened more carefully!!

That principle of pruning a rose to enable it to reach its full potential applies to many plants, vines included. Jesus calls himself the true vine and likens us as the branches of that vine – the branches that bear fruit. Left to our own devices, like the branches of the rose and the vine, we quickly get tangled up and begin to get 'straggly' in our faith and our discipleship. And so there are things that need pruning in order to keep us close to Jesus, things that may block us from the light he offers to guide us through life. The 'dead wood' in each of our lives will be different: but anything that prevents us from knowing Jesus better; from working with him in the world; from staying in touch and in tune with him, is 'dead wood' and needs pruning.

And that applies not just to us as individuals but also collectively as the Church. Covid lockdowns and the subsequent resumption of regular activities has perhaps given us an opportunity to consider where the 'dead wood' might be in our churches. Have we simply gone back to how things were or is there some pruning that could be done to allow the light of Christ to shine brighter, to draw us closer to the heart of God, to help us to bear fruit for God and even to grow. What needs pruning? The coffee morning that has looked the same for 20 odd years? The worship that isn't attracting new folk or appealing to our younger members? The buildings no longer fit for purpose that take so much of our energy and resources?

Pruning can be painful. I still have scars from some of the rose thorn scratches! But it is pruning that creates vibrant and healthy growth. As we again commit ourselves to trust God, to walk with Jesus and to live in the ways of the kingdom let us each reflect on how we will fulfil that commitment and what it is in our lives and the life of our churches that may need pruning in order for that commitment to become a reality.

Thoughts 'One Day I'll Know How Far I'll Go.'

The Walt Disney film *Moana* is a musical action adventure film, based on a legend from a Polynesian Island. It is the story of an adventurous teenager who is inspired to leave the safety and security of her Island, to go on a daring journey to save her people. In our Christian life, there's always an element of not knowing where the call of God will lead us – it's in the future, after all. Little did Andrew, Peter, James and John know what the future would be as they answered Jesus' call to follow him. They trusted him, and saw the person who called them for who he was – at least some of the time! The Iona song 'O where are you going and can I come with you' (from *Heaven Shall not Wait*)

shows this sense of uncertainty and the trust necessary to follow Jesus. The answer to the question is:

I'm going on a journey and welcome companions...
Just join me in travelling and learn all I know.

So how far will we go in answering the call of God? Are we prepared to do difficult things or live with some uncertainty? Will we expect a reward or thanks for what we do? Or is it reward enough to know we are answering God's call? The 'Prayer for Generosity' (attributed to Ignatius Loyola) suggests the idea of labouring and not asking for 'any reward, save that of knowing that we do thy will'.

If you were able to join in the Circuit Covenant Service words similar to those of Ignatius of Loyola may have been shared:

I am no longer my own but yours.

Your will, not mine, be done in all things,

Wherever you may place me, in all that I do and in all that I may endure;

When there is work for me and when there is none;

When I am troubled and when I am at peace.

Your will be done when I am valued and when I am disregarded;

When I find fulfilment and when it is lacking;

When I have all things and when I have nothing.

I willingly offer all I have and am to serve you,

As and where you choose.

Glorious and blessed God,

Father Son and Holy spirit,

You are mine and I am yours.

May it be so for ever.

Let this covenant now made on earth

Be fulfilled In heaven. Amen.

This theme is particularly poignant for me as later this year I will 'Sit down' from full-time Methodist Ministry. Where God will continue to lead me as I enter Supernumerary ministry and what that will look like are yet to be revealed. Exciting and daunting in equal measure. But I have been truly blessed in the Presbyteral Ministry to which He called me for many years and which I accepted, trained for and entered in 2002, my life could not have been more blessed or more fulfilled in any other way. I am truly

grateful to all who I have shared in Ministry with, other Ministers and each of God's people – You. Thank you.

Back to Moana, just a moment. We have one big advantage over her, of course, We can know and trust the One who is calling us. **Amen.**

Introduction:

Moses, speaking to the people, says that one day God will send another prophet like him. This prophet will speak God's words with God's full authority, such that anyone who refuses to listen will be held accountable by God. The people are also warned against listening to false prophets. An authentic prophet's words will prove to be true.

Old Testament Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

'The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own brothers. You must listen to Him. For this is what you asked of the Lord Your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "Let us not hear the voice of the Lord our God nor hear this great fire any more, or we will die."

The Lord said to me: "What they say is good. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their brothers; I will put my words in His mouth, and He will tell them everything I will command Him. If anyone does not listen to my words that the prophet speaks in my name, I myself will call him to account. But a prophet who presumes to speak in my name anything I have not commanded him to say, or a prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, must be put to death."

The Oxford English Dictionary defines a prophet as 'one who speaks for God'. That's a very tall order! Sometimes, it's hard to speak for ourselves, let alone for someone else, and it's not surprising that sometimes, things go wrong. Through Moses, God promises to raise up a prophet who would continue to bring His Word. One who would: follow God's initiative and speak what God would reveal; would follow God's model; would speak God's message and carry God's authority. Here we see it fulfilled in the life of Moses, but there is one to come who will be like no other prophet.

Introduction:

People are astounded by the authority with which Jesus teaches. In the passage from Deuteronomy, we heard of a prophet into whose mouth God put His words. Both of these readings encourage us to consider the authority of those who seek to influence us.

Gospel Reading: Mark 1:21–28 JESUS DRIVES OUT AN EVIL SPIRIT

'They went to Capernaum, and when the Sabbath came, Jesus went into the synagogue and began to teach. The people were amazed at His teaching because He taught them as one who had authority, not as the teachers of the Law.

Just then, a man in their synagogue, who was possessed of an evil spirit cried out, "What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have You come to destroy us? I know who You are – the Holy One of God!"

"Be quiet", Jesus said sternly. "Come out of him!" The evil spirit shook the man violently and came out of him with a shriek.

The people were all so amazed that they asked each other. "What is this? A new teaching – and with authority! He gives even orders to evil spirits and they obey Him." News about Him spread quickly over the whole region of Galilee.'

Reflection:

A High School teacher had injured his back and had to wear a plaster cast around the upper part of his body. It was made to measure and, under his shirt, wasn't noticeable at all. On the first day of a new term, he still had the cast on. He looked at his class profile and realised he had been assigned the toughest pupils in the school.

He walked into a rowdy, noisy classroom. All the pupils were talking and laughing and acted as if he wasn't there. The teacher walked over and opened the window as wide as possible and then started working at his desk. Several times, a strong wind blew his tie up onto his face. Finally, he reached over, picked up a stapler and stapled the tie to his chest in three places and then continued working.

The class immediately fell silent. They were shocked into silence, and, strangely, the teacher had no problems with discipline for the whole of the year!

THEY WERE STUNNED BY HIS AUTHORITY

A similar thing happened on the day that Jesus entered the synagogue in Capernaum and started speaking. All those gathered were stunned into silence as Jesus began to teach for He was different from their usual teachers.

JESUS TAUGHT WITH AUTHORITY

Jesus spoke with an authority they did not recognise and they were spellbound. He held their attention and they listened as He spoke about the work He, God's Son, had come to do. They had never heard anyone speak with such power and authority.

For one man, this was to be a life-changing event. His voice must have cut the air as he cried out! Clearly, his illness caused him great distress. Mark gives a detailed description of it. At that time, very little was understood about any kind of mental condition and all would have been attributed to evil spirits. In any event, Jesus knew how to respond to the man. Everyone was awestruck by the power in His words. The man became calm and was healed.

No-one had ever heard any teacher speak with such power and authority before. He wasn't arrogant or proud, He presented Himself in a way that set Him apart. He never made a grand entrance, but before long, you felt His presence and were drawn to Him. There were no gimmicks or false promises. Why? Because His words rang true. They sprang from His heart and resonated with power and authenticity. It was as if He had a direct line to God – and that is what amazed His listeners. Jesus was truly concerned about everyone who came to hear Him. He wanted them to understand, to know, to learn about God's love and forgiveness. His concern was such that He risked Himself and shared Himself with everyone He met.

The other truly amazing thing was that Jesus not only spoke with authority, He lived by what he spoke. The authority of His teaching extended to the authority of His actions. As the story shows us, He backed up His words with deeds – even giving Himself up on the Cross for our sins and eternal life. And it is to this amazing Son of God that we are called to place our trust, our faith, our lives – to live by His teaching and to live it out by our actions. As we approach Lent, we will discover more of what it means to live by word and action. May we all learn to discern His voice – in every aspect of our lives, in good times and in times of trial and testing, and be ready and willing to act on what we discover. **Amen.**

Lord Jesus Christ, help us to hear Your voice, not just in the Word of Scripture,

But in moments of prayer, times of fellowship, the beauty of nature and the events of life.

Help us in all the uncertainties of this world, all its relativism and conundrums.

Humble, yet of true authority. Amen.
