Bible Reading: John 6:24-35

- ²⁴Once the crowd realized that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they got into the boats and went to Capernaum in search of Jesus.
- ²⁵ When they found him on the other side of the lake, they asked him, "Rabbi, when did you get here?"
- ²⁶ Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw the signs I performed but because you ate the loaves and had your fill. ²⁷ Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For on him God the Father has placed his seal of approval."
- ²⁸ Then they asked him, "What must we do to do the works God requires?"
- ²⁹ Jesus answered, "The work of God is this: to believe in the one he has sent."
- ³⁰ So they asked him, "What sign then will you give that we may see it and believe you? What will you do? ³¹ Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written: 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'"
- ³² Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, it is not Moses who has given you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. ³³ For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."
- ³⁴ "Sir," they said, "always give us this bread."
- ³⁵ Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Thought for the Day:

In response to his people's plea for help in the wilderness, God gave them food enough for each day and said, in effect, 'Trust me for tomorrow!' As the Psalmist says, 'they ate and were well filled, for he gave them what they craved.' God fed and protected them, but he also required them to be obedient and faithful, in a two-way deal.

When the crowds asked Jesus for a miraculous sign, he gave them a similar answer, that in response they are to believe in him, the bread from heaven. That was an answer that raised even more questions!

It is good to ask challenging questions as we try to understand what God's work for us may be. God can deal with our complaints against him and he hears our questions. But perhaps, as is always the case with Jesus' teaching, we will never get a straight answer, to make sure that we are stretched by working it out for ourselves.

Our natural instinct is that, before we are willing to do the work God wants, we need to ask more questions. But perhaps God needs us to just make the first move, to step forward, not knowing where we are going but trusting him to guide our next step, to know where our next meal will come from. The living bread of which Jesus speaks is a gift that will do much more than just feed our bodies for the day. It will sustain us for life, in all its challenges and interactions. Just as a shared meal includes conversation, laughter, relationships and intimacy, so the sharing of our lives with others can meet many needs.

During lockdown, a keen west-country gardener wanted to help those who could only get out for their daily walk. She operated a bring-and-buy stall at the roadside outside her house, encouraging many to take healthy exercise in their own gardens while raising thousands for <u>local cancer charities</u>. The socially distanced conversations about plants also fed the souls of the lonely. There is more to being fed than eating bread.

As we do the work of God by believing in the one whom he has sent, our lives will reflect the quality of the Living Bread that we have shared. It is still a two-way deal as we respond to what we have received by sharing it. As Paul explained to the Ephesians, each of us has been given the gift that is right and sufficient for doing God's work. Are we engaging with the task, even as we question what it is?

- Invite people, in small groups, to discuss some or all of these questions: What do we need or want? What is essential to our day or to our lives? Do we ever tell ourselves that we could do without certain things?
- In the Lord's Prayer, we pray for 'our daily bread', which is understood to mean neither an abundance nor a lack, but just the right amount for the day and trusting God for tomorrow. In

- today's reading, Jesus uses bread as a metaphor for everything we need (i.e. not just food).
- How far do our lives reflect a desire to focus on what God gives and wants from us today? How can we relate this to a world that is always planning for tomorrow? Do we trust that God will provide enough tomorrow, so we can share what we have today with others?

Hymn: May the mind of Christ my Saviour (StF 504)

May the mind of Christ, my Savior, live in me from day to day, by His love and power controlling all I do and say.

May the word of God dwell richly in my heart from hour to hour, so that all may see I triumph only through His power.

May the peace of God my Father rule my life in everything, that I may be calm to comfort sick and sorrowing.

May the love of Jesus fill me as the waters fill the sea; Him exalting, self-abasing: this is victory.

May I run the race before me, strong and brave to face the foe, looking only unto Jesus as I onward go.

Intercessions:

Lord, we come to you, the Great Provider, with all our cares and our needs, trusting that you will provide for us. So often we tell you what we *want* rather than asking for what we really need. Teach us to listen to your voice so that our wills join with yours and so that our asking becomes harmonious with what you want for us. As we lay our petitions before you,

remind us that what you give us is what we truly need even if we don't always recognise it.

Jesus, bread of life,

help us to trust in your provision for us.

We commend our athletes to you, Lord, as they compete in the Olympic Games. We thank you for the joy that sport brings to so many, whether watching or participating. We pray that all the athletes will be able to bring their best to their competitions. We pray for the witness of those who are Christians, that their love for you will have an impact for good on those around them.

Jesus, bread of life,

help us to trust in your provision for us.

Lord, we are saddened when we hear of abuse. We pray for all those who have suffered and still live with the consequences. We pray that they will be able to find peace of mind and healing of deep hurts with you. And we pray for their abusers, that they will come to a place of repentance and know your forgiveness.

Jesus, bread of life,

help us to trust in your provision for us.

We thank you, Lord, for this church community and the nourishment we find by spending time here with you. Fill us with your Spirit as we praise you so that we may go out from here enriched and ready to serve you in the wider world. Help us to encourage one another and build each other up, that this may be a place of affirmation, acceptance and love. We pray for our leaders, both locally and nationally, asking that you will provide them with wisdom, patience and grace.

Jesus, bread of life,

help us to trust in your provision for us.

Lord, we offer ourselves to you as we prepare to go forward into the coming week. We pause in the stillness now to think of the places we will go to and name some of the people we will meet. We offer any potentially difficult situations up to you, asking for your courage to face them. Teach us not to take your gifts for granted, but instead to keep our eyes fixed on you. Draw us constantly back to you to find the energy, strength and refreshment that we need for our daily living.

Jesus, bread of life, help us to trust in your provision for us, Amen.

Walter Chalmers Smith (1824 – 1908)

Reflection:

A writer remembers that as a child, he was desperate to own a Rubik's Cube and was thrilled to receive one as a Christmas gift. he spent a day making small changes to the cube and then 'solving' it back to its original state, where every side of the cube is a different colour. It didn't take long, however, before he changed too much! he was over-confident and spun it through too many twists and turns. However hard he tried, he couldn't get it back to its original state. He had no one to blame but himself and he was devastated. He would have loved to say "I persevered, learned how the cube works and returned it to its 'perfect' state", but the truth is it went into a cupboard where he wouldn't see it or be shamed by it anymore. He even considered unpeeling the coloured stickers and gluing them back on in the 'right' way or taking the cube apart, but ultimately he just gave up on it. David is reaping the consequences of his earlier mistakes as his children fight to succeed him. He wants things to go back to how they were – to restore his relationship with Absalom – but he can't. He asks his generals to spare Absalom but this is a fight for the kingdom, where the losing side are rarely treated mercifully. So Joab's armour bearers make certain of Absalom's defeat when they get the chance.

Some things are beyond our power but that doesn't mean hiding away from them. David's grief at his son's death is natural and without it he would not be human, but he clearly wishes he could do things over again. He can't — and now he will need to live with what has happened. We have all made mistakes in life, some of which have consequences that we are still bearing today. We can't undo what has been done. God is not punishing us. The consequence of God giving us free will is that he can't protect us from the results of our own decisions. God is, however, right there with us, in the

midst of all our grief and anger and regret. As we turn back to God we receive forgiveness, wisdom from the experience and the certain hope that God will be with us in the future, helping us as we try to follow him more closely.

Solomon chooses an 'understanding mind' to help him govern as wisely as his father. God, pleased by this request, grants him this and more.

'Then David rested with his fathers and was buried in the City of David. He had reigned for forty years over Israel – seven years in Hebron and thirty-three in Jerusalem. So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David, and his rule was firmly established.

Solomon showed his love for the Lord by walking according to the statues of his father, David, except that he offered sacrifices and burned incense in the high places.

The king went to Gibeon to offer sacrifices, for that was the most important high place, and Solomon offered a thousand burnt offerings on that altar.

At Gibeon, the Lord appeared to Solomon during the night in a dream, and God said, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you."

Solomon answered, "You have shown great kindness to Your servant, my father David, because He was faithful to You and righteous and upright in heart. You have continued this great kindness to him and have given him a son to sit on his throne this very day.

"Now, O Lord my God, you have made Your servant king in place of my father David. But I am only a little child and do not know how to carry out my duties. Your servant is here among the people You have chosen, a great people, too numerous to count or number. So give Your servant a

discerning heart to govern Your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of Yours?" The Lord was pleased that Solomon had asked for this. So God said to him, "Since you have asked for this and not for long life or wealth for yourself, nor have asked for the death of Your enemies but for discernment in administering justice, I will do what you have asked. I will give you a wise and discerning heart, so that there will never have been anyone like you, nor will there ever be. Moreover, I will give you what you have not asked for – both riches and honour – so that in your lifetime you will have no equal among kings. And if you walk in my ways and obey my statutes and commands as David your father did, I will give you a long life." **Amen.**

Gospel Reading: John chapter 6 vs. 51-58 'JESUS, THE BREAD OF LIFE'

Introduction:

Jesus, addressing a large crowd, makes a very bold statement. It confuses the crowds – and it may well confuse us.

In this short passage, He talks about Himself in a way that is very difficult to understand. We need to ask God in His wisdom to help us see its relevance for us.

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live for ever. This bread is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world."

Then the Jews began to sharply argue among themselves, "How can this man give us His flesh to eat?"

Jesus said to them, "I tell you the truth, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in him. Just as the living Father sent me and I live because of the Father, so the one who feeds on me will live because of me. This is the bread that came from heaven. Your forefathers ate manna and died, but he who feeds on this bread will live for ever."

Reflection: 'CHOICES'

Whether we realise it or not, throughout our lives, both consciously and subconsciously, we are making choices every day. When we are young, they are relatively simple; e.g. Do we want cereal or toast? Play indoors or out? Do our homework or play on our internet games, our choice of pets. As we develop, our choices become more important; college, university or apprenticeship; our choice of career; live at home or seek our independence. As we get older, choice becomes more complex still; our choice of relationships, rent or buy; choices of furnishing and decoration; where to live; bettering our prospects; how to invest savings. Later in life, some choices are made for us: provision and place of care; managing our finances. The list is endless. Then there are spiritual choices: what do we believe - what do we accept or reject; the decision to become a Christian and working out how that shapes our lives. Some choices are easy, others are more far reaching and shape the person we become. Life has always

been and will always be fashioned by choice. But how can we make the best choices? One answer comes in our reading from 1Kings of a series of choices that would define the future of God's people; and that is wisdom.

King David had died and a successor needed to be appointed. And in his wisdom, God had chosen David's son Solomon. Chapter 2 shows us that though only a young man, he had shown great wisdom in the way he had treated those who were a threat to him. So now, Solomon has to make choices. He could have run away and sought asylum; he could have chosen to divide the Kingdom among his brothers. So what did he choose; to take his father's throne and establish his kingdom. He had formed an alliance with the Pharaoh in Egypt and married his daughter-was that a wise choice? It could have led to divided loyalties. Then, he finished building his palace and finally the Temple of God. Why? So that he could count the wealth he had amassed or offer sacrifices and worship to God, and give Israel a place where they could do the same?

God appeared to Solomon in a dream and challenged him to make another choice; was he to do as God told him, listen to God's plan for his life, or invite him to make a request? A strange choice with perhaps an obvious answer - to ask for what he wanted. Who wouldn't? But Solomon shows great wisdom in his choice. Because of God's kindness and faithfulness to his father David and himself - he asks for the one thing he knows he lacks – 'a discerning heart' - in other words the wisdom to govern the people and discern the difference between right and wrong. God is pleased with Solomon because he made the right choice. He could have asked for wealth, long life or the death of his enemies. So, at last, Solomon has realised that his choices must be replaced in searching for the wisdom of God so that he may rule justly and compassionately over God's people. He does this with great humility and submission to God's will, seeking the common good, and the result will be all the blessings that will follow.

The wisdom of God is a key factor in making good choices.

In our reading from John, we hear words of Jesus which give us more encouragement in making wise choices. It comes as the conclusion of a lengthy conversation between Jesus and the crowds where they have been asking for signs and miracles so that they may choose to believe in order to gain life. He reminds them again that He is the bread of life. The crowd would be familiar with their ancestors eating manna — 'bread' - in the

wilderness but its intention was to meet their immediate need. The bread Jesus speaks of will not just satisfy them now but will satisfy their eternal hunger. He is the living bread which He will sacrifice for the life of the world. Jesus stresses that this is an important choice to make. Verse 57 speaks of His relationship with God. The living God sent Him and He lives because of Him. A difficult concept to understand. As Jesus depends on God for His life so the person who feeds on Jesus depends on Him for their life.

So, just as ordinary bread (or its equivalent) is a vital part of our physical being, so Jesus, as the living bread, is a physical part of our spiritual being. Our choices are becoming more complex. Choose Jesus - choose eternal life. But God has given us tools to help us in our decision - making: worship, prayer, reading Scripture. They help us develop the gift of discernment - wisdom.

Attributed to theologian Reinold Niebuhr, this verse says:

"God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change,

The courage to change the things I can,

And the wisdom to know the difference.

Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at a time,

Accepting hardship as a pathway to peace,

Taking, as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it,

Trusting that You will make all things right if I surrender to Your will,

So that I may be reasonably happy in this life,

And supremely happy with You forever in the next. Amen"

Jesus, bread of life:

feed us and nourish us with Yourself.

We bring to mind those who are spiritually hungry. Those who are searching for something more beyond themselves but who have not yet found You. Give us the wisdom and the sensitivity to guide people to You. We pray for the young people of our country, so many of whom have never had the opportunity to meet with Jesus or anyone who loves Him. We pray for all those who received exam results this week. We pray for Your guidance as they seek where to go next with either their education or into the workplace. Give courage to Christians in schools, colleges, universities and workplaces that they may be a shining witness to their friends and colleagues. We pray for those Christians who are persecuted for their faith yet still remain constant, trusting that You will supply their needs.

Jesus, bread of life:

feed us and nourish us with Yourself.

Finally, Lord, in the stillness, we bring our own personal needs to You. Help us to rejoice that You care about every detail of our lives, even the ones we think You don't notice. We ask that You give us food for our journeys this week. And we name in the silence, places or situations that might be hard for us. Nourish us with Your presence in every situation we find ourselves, particularly those unexpected moments where we need extra help.

Jesus, bread of life:

feed us and nourish us with Yourself.

Breathe Your life into our lives.

Fill us with your Spirit that we may overflow with You. Amen.

'Always with me'

What are the items that travel with you? The things that are always with you? If you carry a handbag, or a 'man bag', or a rucksack, around with you what do you keep in it? What do you always have in the glove compartment of your car? What would you never be without?

I wonder if any of the things you've thought of are for reasons of security, safety or protection? In the summer I will often have a small tube of sun screen in my bag. In the winter a pair of gloves. I nearly always have lip salve in my bag as well and I have a personal alarm which I sometimes put in my bag and other times slip into my pocket.

In today's reading we'll be hearing about the things God gives us to help us in different situations. Things that we should keep with us at all times.

The reading comes from Ephesians and like many of the stories we read in the Bible uses imagery that would be familiar to the people of the time. Still part of the Roman Empire the first hearers would have been used to seeing Roman soldiers on the streets every day. Soldiers who had been trained to fight and who wore a uniform that signified power and strength. Paul uses this picture as he addresses the new Christians in Ephesus. He describes how God gives them powerful protection and he encourages them not to be afraid. The armour that God gives them is not for fighting against people but for standing up against the things that are wrong in the world. Paul tells them that God's love for them makes them as strong as the

strongest person they know, and that they must use this strength to share God's message of peace. And Paul's message is all the more amazing when we recall that he is writing these words from a prison cell in Rome. We'll hear what he has to say after we've sung our next hymn.

Hymn: For I'm building a people of power (Mission Praise 151)

For I'm building a people of power and I'm making a people of praise, that will move through this land by my Spirit, and will glorify my precious name. Build your Church, Lord, make us strong, Lord, join our hearts, Lord, through your Son; make us one, Lord, in your body, in the kingdom of your Son.

Bible Reading: Ephesians 6: 10 - 20 NLT

A final word: Be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on all of God's armour so that you will be able to stand firm against all strategies of the devil. For we are not fighting against flesh-and-blood enemies, but against evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world, against mighty powers in this dark world, and against evil spirits in the heavenly places.

Therefore, put on every piece of God's armour so you will be able to resist the enemy in the time of evil. Then after the battle you will still be standing firm. Stand your ground, putting on the belt of truth and the body armour of God's righteousness. For shoes, put on the peace that comes from the Good News so that you will be fully prepared. In addition to all of these, hold up the shield of faith to stop the fiery arrows of the devil. Put on salvation as your helmet, and take the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

Pray in the Spirit at all times and on every occasion. Stay alert and be persistent in your prayers for all believers everywhere.

And pray for me, too. Ask God to give me the right words so I can boldly explain God's mysterious plan that the Good News is for Jews and Gentiles alike. I am in chains now, still preaching this message as God's

ambassador. So pray that I will keep on speaking boldly for him, as I should.

Reflection:

Paul is writing to the Ephesians whilst he is under arrest and he shows great vulnerability by admitting to the situation he finds himself in. He asks for prayer that he might be the sort of Christian that he is encouraging his readers to be. So I wonder what kind of vulnerabilities do we face and what might we be praying for in order that we can be the Christians we want to be. Or rather, so that we can be the Christians God asks us to be.

One of the key teaching points in Ephesians 6 is that we aren't called to be 'stand alone' Christians but to stand together and support one another in whatever ways we can. The armour of God is for the community so there is something in Paul's words that challenges us to think about how we might gather our individual prayers so that we become better praying communities and live out our faith in a more corporate way. We can do this by sharing together the things that concern us and pray together about them. Meeting to read the Bible together and to think and talk about what we understand about what we read and what confuses us. Or perhaps getting together over a coffee to discuss the previous Sunday's service, be that the printed service or the service in church. And I don't just mean talking about whether or not you liked the hymns!! (Although of course the words of hymns have a lot to say to us). No, I'm thinking about a conversation about the sermon content for example. Did you relate to it? What was the message the preacher was trying to convey? And there's never anything wrong with saying that actually you didn't understand it! And all these things can happen physically in person in a church building, a home, a coffee shop.....or face to face electronically on Zoom or FaceTime or other media platforms. Encouraging one another in our faith and living out our faith corporately doesn't need to be difficult – we just need to have a desire to do it.

Paul talks, as do other biblical writers, about us facing a spiritual battle that we need to be equipped to face. That imagery isn't necessarily helpful to many people, especially in our democratic society, but how about if we look at it in a slightly different way. The day-to-day 'temptations' we each face that draw us away from times of prayer or reading the Bible or going to church. Our lack of confidence in being able to talk about what we believe when people ask us. All things that God equips us to overcome through those gifts that Paul refers to as the armour of God. Gifts that grow when we spend time with God and meet and share with one another. For in this way we equip, strengthen and unite ourselves by faith for God's work.

And should you need further encouragement remember these words:
